ABS fieldtrip to Karioitahi, 18 March 2000

On the west coast, at the base of the Awhitu Peninsula which is an ancient sandbar enclosing the Manukau Harbour, is Karioitahi surf beach. We were met by local Councillor, Judith Hull who described the changes around the surf club. The low sand dunes have been impacted heavily by traffic of varying kinds. The community (the area lies on the boundary between Environment Waikato and Auckland Regional Council) has been stabilising these dunes since 1998 by fencing and locally planting pingao. As the area stabilises pohutukawa will also be planted.

Of the few pohutukawa around, we saw only two that were probably naturally growing in the area. Generally the sand cliffs/hills are covered in *Phormium tenax, Cortaderia splendens, Isolepis nodosa, Muehlenbeckia complexa* and small shrubs of *Pseudopanax lessonii, Coprosma acerosa,* and in more sheltered places *Macropiper excelsa* and *Geniostoma rupestre.* There were also occasional *Ozothamnus leptophyllus* and *Dodonaea viscosa.*

The cliffs are indented and it was here that we were rewarded with some herbaceous delights. *Apium prostratum* and *Lobelia anceps* were common in these areas, but also there was *Sarcocornia quinqueflora*, *Acaena novae-zelandiae*, and *Tetragonia trigyna*. In damp seepages were *Selliera*

radicans, Samolus repens, Leptinella dioica, L. dispersa subsp. rupestris, Liliaeopsis novaezelandiae, Juncus caespiticius, Zoysia pauciflora (thank you Ewen, not Z. minima that we thought on the day) and Adiantum cunninghamii. There were Carex pumila and Triglochin striata on the sand flats.

Weeds were present as usual including bone-seed (*Chrysanthemoides monilifera*), *Alnus glutinosa* (x1 plant), lupin, velvety nightshade (*Solanum chenopodioides*), *Cortaderia selloana, Rumex sagittatus, Carpobrotus edulis, Briza maxima*, alligator weed (*Alternanthera philoxeroides*), and in two places the exotic holly fern, *Cyrtomium falcatum*.

It was a good turn out and we had great leadership from Bec Stanley and Steve Benham. We added quite a few species to the tentative species list, even some trees such as karaka (*Coryncocarpus laevigatus*) amongst other reasonable size trees up a short valley. We were on the look out for *Euphorbia glauca* and *Austrofestuca littoralis*, which have previously been recorded here previously by Carse some 100 years ago, with no luck.

The Karioitahi species list will be included in the next ABS Journal – Editor.
