LECTURES AND MEETINGS

The Annual Meeting of the Auckland Botanical Society was held at the Auckland University College on May 22nd. After the business was concluded a series of very beautiful slides were shown by Mr. Millener.

It was felt that this news letter could not go to press without a few lines of welcome to our newly elected president, Miss M.W. Crookes. As editress of these bulletins, and being very modest, it falls on two committee members to write a short appreciation of her work for the society. These quarterly news letters were introduced in 1943 as a means of keeping the country members in touch with the activities of the society. From the beginning Miss Crookes has had the thankless task of collecting news items from reluctant contributors, in fact, at first this often entailed the editress herself supplying all the material for the whole issue.

Perhaps few, except the committee members, fully appreciate the work Miss Crookes has put into the society, especially during the war years. As a lecturer she attracts large enthusiastic audiences, who always enjoy and appreciate her material, while on excursions her leadership greatly benefits the participants.

Miss Crookes graduated M.A. with double honours in Botany and English from Auckland University College, and is the author of that well known book "Plant Life in Maoriland". Her special interest has been first in New Zealand orchids, then in the ferns. On the former subject she has published many articles in New Zealand periodicals and, over the past three years, she has been engaged in making a complete revision of Dobbie's "Ferns of New Zealand" This has entailed an immense amount of work, as many revisions have had to be made to bring the New Zealand names into line with modern taxonomics of ferns. We hope that this book will be on sale shortly.

It is an honour to the Society to have Miss Crookes as president, and we hope that her year will be a pleasant and a successful one.
