The Canterbury Botanical Society attracts both professional botanists and others with an interest in plants, particularly in the conservation and cultivation of the indigenous flora of New Zealand. The membership is stable at nearly 200, and the finances are healthy.

Meetings and Newsletter. A monthly programme of meetings have been arranged, as listed above. Mostly these have been held in Room A6 at the University, with one, as an experiment, in E7 in the Engineering School. A monthly newsletter maintains contact among members; we thank the production and distribution team who include: Julie & Ron Close, Fiona Lees, Neil O'Brien, Max Visch and John Ward.

Field trips and camps. The monthly field trips have been maintained, and we are grateful to the various leaders. The December weekend and January week-long camps were also run, as usual. We thank Ron Close for managing both camps, the December camp being held jointly with members of the Nelson Botanical Society who were responsible for the local arrangements. The Catlins attracted 45 participants to the January camp for which Geraldine and John Ward co-ordinated the catering arrangements with their usual flair.

*Conservation.* The Society made submissions on the proposed granting of logging rights for the Waitutu Maori Block to the Minister of Conservation and the Minister of Forests, and to the Mayor of Christchurch regarding the retention of the whole of the Travis Swamp area. Encouraging responses were received. The Society has offered the Queen Elizabeth II Trust a grant-in-aid of \$500 towards the cost of goat fencing the northern boundary of the Ahuriri Reserve on condition of access. The conditional offer has been accepted.

"Small-leaved Shrubs of New Zealand". The long-awaited book written by Hugh Wilson and illustrated by Tim Galloway was launched to a packed throng at the University in October. The book is selling well, and the Society's interest-free loan towards the publication costs has been repaid by Manuka Press.

Journal. The annual Journal (27) was published containing a range of articles by members. Colin Burrows acted as Editor while David Norton was on leave. Journal 25, which contains the distribution maps for small-leaved shrubs in Canterbury and Westland, is now sold out, but there are still back issues of some other numbers available.

Students. The Committee will bring a recommendation to the Annual Meeting regarding the institution of a modest grants scheme for university students as an aid for research costs. The Society also supported the Science Fair again in 1993, awarding three book prizes; Christine Kokay and Pat Morris were our judges.

Members. We regret to report the continuing disability of Professor David Lloyd, and the passing away of John Thompson, an Honorary Life Member, and Jean & Stan Reid.
