The Journal

Journal No.36 was Warwick Harris's second edition. Although having fewer pages, 68, than No.35, the quality of the articles was, as usual, of a high calibre. Members of the Society wrote all but one of the articles. Eight articles highlighted in some way threats to our native flora. Others considered the origin of the *Sophora chathamica*, divaricating shrubs and time, angiosperm foundations, and early angiosperm fossils.

Hugh Wilson again enhanced the publication with his fine drawings.

Peter Wardle has played a major role in setting up the programme, assisted by the Secretary, Treasurer and Mary Korver, Landcare Research. The Symposium will be held in conjunction with the AGM on June 7 2003.

Membership

Current membership stands at 207. Projects

The Society is to support an application for funds to fence and to preserve two populations of a new species of *Oleania*, in the Waimakariri River flood plains.

Colin Burrows represents the Society regarding public comment on Pastoral Land Reviews, while Miles Giller, who now holds a position with the Queen Elizabeth II Trust, provides a useful link between our Society and that organization.

Through Brian Molloy, the Riccarton Bush Trust sought the Society's backing on the proposed predator exclusion fence to encompass the Bush. This backing was readily given.

Awards

Derek Cook was the well-deserved recipient of the Senior Bledisloe Trophy. He is well known for his wide knowledge of the alpine flora and for compiling a remarkable collection of exceptional photographs of his favourite plants. At his home, Derek has established a living collection of native plants gleaned from several parts of the country. For some years he has kept a guiding hand on the Society's financial affairs.

Terry Thomsen was awarded the Junior Bledisloe Trophy for the best student talk of the year. Terry also received a monetary grant for his research into the genetic variation of *Nothofagus fusca*.

Pat Morris and Neil O'Brien judged botanical exhibits at the Canterbury and Westland Science Fair. Maryam Iskander and Jody Hu of Riccarton High

School received the Senior Prize for their entry, "Solutions for Plants." Louise Smits, Breens Intermediate, took the Junior Prize for her entry entitled "What Conditions are Best for *Pinus radiata* Growth". Books to the value of \$50 were awarded to winners.

Colin Webb received the Allan Mere at a short ceremony at the Society's February monthly meeting. Anthony Wright, President of the New Zealand Botanical Society made the presentation.

During the year, Margaret Austin was made a Companion of the Royal Society of New Zealand. Our Society congratulates all these achievers.

Student Support

Robin Mitchell received a grant of \$500 for a project on ecosystems restoration. Don Morta was awarded \$400 for his work on the ecology of a new species of *Oleania*.
